8	Exploring portraiture: Students explore the theme of self-identity through portraiture, starting with foundational techniques in proportion, features, and tonal drawing. They then experiment with distortion and digital editing, drawing inspiration from contemporary artists to create expressive, individualised responses that reflect personal identity through both traditional and modern media.	Ernst Haeckel: The Design of Nature: Students explore the connection between science and art through Ernst Haeckel's intricate illustrations of natural forms. They study how observation and symmetry inform scientific and artistic processes, then create a clay piece inspired by his work. The project blends biology and creativity, enhancing skills in form, pattern, and 3D media.	Narrative Art Project: Students explore how art communicates stories across cultures by studying traditional styles such as Japanese woodblock prints, Persian illustrations, and Mughal miniatures. They develop skills in line work, pattern, and colour, then apply these to create a personal zine that expresses their identity through visual storytelling.
